Deck 6mm marine ply overlaid with Australian Red Cedar & Canadian Yellow Cedar We all look forward to christening day in the near future *John O.*






A fantastic job starting with thousands of nails to be peened .

Alf Jaco on the floor with his bucking iron braced against the knee or thigh hold it against the nail head, then peen or chase the rove.


Then the engine mounts, decking,

From the designers

Pintail is a 10' Kayak with a unique origin. When planning the script for the kayak DVD we were producing, we wanted a design that would **show building techniques** which incorporated tight curves and would require us to demonstrate our shop tips for dealing with them. At the same time, we wanted to produce an ultra-light weight kayak that would easily fit on top of event the smallest car.

 $m{A}$ lot of internal cabin and cockpit detail work .



We're making real progress lately, the aft deck beams are in, the hanging knees are being finalised and most of the hatches have solid timber backing in place. The forward bulkhead has been reinforced inside and out to prevent any possibility of the hatch distorting.

Mapping Lake Macquarie (our Marine Heritage)

The earliest detail Charts of the Lake were produced by Captain Deed prior to the 1st world War.

Cpt. Deed was Harbour master of Newcastle. His sons also were later employed as harbour master




In **1902** Captain Deed, purchased a large waterfront allotment at Carey Bay, backing onto Excelsior Street. He built a large boatshed on the waterfront as a weekender. This became known as 'The Camp, where Deed kept an ex-naval cutter from "HMS Powerful" which he converted to the "Black Angel". The cottage is still in use as a B& B is known as "The Captains Cottage " and is on the water front at the end of Laycock St CareyBay



Capt. Deed used an ex-naval cutter converted into to a 35 ft yawl rigged yacht, which he named the "Black Angel" (later the "Seabird"). It was from this vessel that he and his sons, Neville (then nine years) and Ernest (then seven years) took soundings of Lake Macquarie during their summer holidays - the boys swinging the lead line, while their father jotted down the depth measurements on a rough linen chart. The crew was later joined by a younger son, Alan. .

Commencing in 1907, the family set about to permanently record water depths of the lake, which was then sparsely populated and mostly bordered by dense bushland. This project was completed at a leisurely pace and within seven years Captain Deed had produced the first chart of Lake Macquarie. This was the standard of hydrography for many years, a real boon to fishermen and sailing enthusiasts.



The above section of the chart now called the Airforce channel is older than WW2 when it was used by the air force crash boats. The present channel runs past Swan Bay to Marks Point

Something to think about in getting a better channel long term. This article has previously been used to encourage revised thinking on channel dredging. The old channel has recently opened itself and may now be dredged.

As well as recording depths, Deed also named many unnamed points around the lake, which can be seen on his maps. Snake Point near Valentine was named when young Ernest stepped ashore disturbing a coiled snake, Marjory's Bay (now Chain Valley Bay) was named after Deed's daughter.

The deepest point marked on those maps was off north-east Pulbah Island - a depth of 44 feet.
